The Rector writes....

My dear Parishioners

As we begin to take baby steps in terms of coming out of lockdown there are certain things we perhaps appreciate in a new way. I found it a really moving and beautiful experience to see people back in our church buildings to worship together on Good Friday and Easter Day. Throughout lockdown, I have appreciated so much the efforts of our technology team, Colin Robinette and William Mathers in making services available to everyone at home. Yet there's something so special about being able to worship together in person. The music of the organ, the care and attention that went into the simple but beautiful decoration of the churches, all helped to create a very lovely atmosphere. Even if one attends church services occasionally, there is something very reassuring and encouraging about being able to worship together, if the desire enters our soul. Many parents have also been thankful to see children getting back to school again after such a long period of online learning. Schools and teachers have done a magnificent job and we are greatly indebted to them for all their efforts on our children's behalf but nothing quite compares to getting back to school and seeing one's friends and teachers in person again.

As this magazine goes to print, garden centres are reopening and there are further decisions being made about how things might be reopened in the next little while. The rolling out of the vaccination programme has been a great success and we are all indebted to the medical teams that have got through so much work so efficiently. The knowledge of having some protection against the virus has given people confidence as they start to get out and about again. I have spoken to people and heard people interviewed on the radio who are making their first cautious journeys beyond their homes after 13 months of not getting beyond their gardens. Whether it's a trip to a garden centre to buy some plants or a visit to a Sunday service it's a sign of hope, a belief that better days are to come. These are all important things to behold and to witness in our society at the present time.

For such a long time we were inclined to take all our freedoms for granted. We had so many choices constantly available to us. There were always places to go, people to visit, experiences to discover and participate in. The past year has reminded us not to take these things for granted. Everything has in that sense changed forever. The Church will have a major task to rebuild and renew our spiritual life and community together.

Maybe there are valuable lessons we have learned through this experience. We

appreciate just how precious people are in our lives. We value the services they offer, whether it's cooking and preparing food and drinks, selling clothes or cutting hair. We recognise how important it is to stand with others and among others as we move into a new future. Instead of asking what can life bring me, we maybe ask different questions, like what can I bring to this life and offer to God and to others?

Are there things God has taught me or revealed to me about His faithfulness, His constancy and His love that might make a real difference to how we do things in the future? Are there values we need to rediscover, things we need to give up or possibilities we need to explore?

Before we move on too quickly, perhaps the first step is to assess where we are and give thanks that we have made it to this point. Maybe there are people to say thank you to, whether it is in person or by sending them a message.

By simply showing up and continuing to do their job these people have been crucial to our survival through this difficult season. I think of people like our GP and local pharmacy. I think of delivery people and postal workers. I think of the vital role played by cleaning staff in so many settings.

I think of the quiet compassion of Funeral Directors, the checkout staff at our local shops and supermarkets and garages. I think of those who have written and published books that have brought me to different places in my imagination or sowed stimulating thoughts through their words. I think of those who have prayed with me or for me. I think of parishioners who have cared for and encouraged me and my extended family.

To one and all I say at this point in time, thank you and let us keep working together to do all we can to be a community of love and care that spreads the fragrance of Jesus in all we seek to do.

May I ask people to continue to phone people they know who might be isolated or going through difficult circumstances? May I ask people to continue to pray for the life and witness and worship of the Church? May I ask us to be careful and vigilant as we follow Government guidelines and follow the best advice to stay safe? May I ask also that we be kind and patient with each other as we work out new ways and systems that will lead us under God into the future?

Christian Aid Week

Christian Aid was founded in 1945 when Christians wanted to offer relief and reconciliation in post-war Europe. From its early days Christian Aid has assisted people and communities on the basis of need, regardless of race and religion.

Today it is the official relief, development and advocacy agency of 41 sponsoring churches in Britain and Ireland, and it is part of the worldwide church community.

Christian Aid is self-evidently a Christian organisation. The board, appointed by the sponsoring churches, is trustee of the vision, purpose and values of Christian Aid, supplying a mandate to work for the eradication of poverty. The organisation is active in some of the world's poorest countries.

This year there will be a 'Walk for Water' during Christian Aid week. Due to the Pandemic, our parish coffee mornings have had to be suspended and therefore our normal fundraising opportunities have been limited. As an alternative, a small group intend to walk 5k whilst carrying buckets of water to resemble what women like Rose have to do every day in order for her family to survive.

PSNI warn of fraudsters impersonating police officers

Detectives from PSNI's Economic Crime Unit are warning the public to be extremely vigilant following multiple reports of criminals posing as police officers. Police have recently received numerous reports from residents across Northern Ireland stating that they have been contacted by people claiming to be officers asking them to withdraw money from their accounts and hand over bank cards, jewellery and other valuables. Detective Inspector Joanne Harris, from the Economic Crime Unit said: "Over recent days, we have seen an increase in the number of scams reported to us where fraudsters pose as police officers. Unfortunately, this has resulted in people losing large sums of money and valuables with some people being told they need to leave money in an envelope outside their house to be collected. Victims have been asked about how much money they keep in their house and are told not to let family members know that they have been contacted. One older person was accused of owing money whilst another person was enticed to leave their house with a sum of money to meet a fraudster. Luckily, this person's suspicions were raised and she did not lose any money. I am urgently advising the public to be vigilant at all times and to be aware that police officers will never call you and ask for cash, bank details or questions about valuable possessions. Criminals are continuously coming up with advanced and sophisticated ways of targeting people, especially those who are more vulnerable or older. If you have older relatives or family members, please take time to share this information with them so they can be fully aware of this type of scam. Our message is simple, never ever disclose any personal or banking details to anyone over the phone or online, no matter where they say they are calling from or how convincing they may seem." Protecting your personal information and banking details is extremely important. If you have received a call of this kind or if you are concerned by the intent of unsolicited calls, emails or letters, then please call police on the non-emergency number 101, make a report to Action Fraud via their website www.actionfraud.police.uk or by phoning 0300 123 2040. 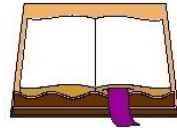

'In Christ shall all be made alive'



30 March 2021

Aileen Stockdale, Woodfall Manor, Annahilt

Following a Service in St Mark's Church, Newtownsaville, burial took place in adjoining Churchyard

We were all deeply shocked by the very unexpected and untimely death of Aileen Stockdale.

Aileen was a Geography graduate who worked at Aberdeen University for 15 years before joining the Queen's University, Belfast in 2006.

Aileen was fiercely intelligent, full of excellent ideas, energetic and enthusiastic, and always generous with her time. She was dedicated to the mentoring of junior staff and PhD students, and enjoyed seeing new academics develop in their careers. She gave diligent advice with openness and honesty, and had a knack for hitting the nail on the head. Yet she was also incredibly humble. Aileen loved a laugh and enjoyed the 'craic'.

Aileen became the Director of Educational Planning at Queen's from 2008 to 2014. Later she joined the School of Natural and Built Environment at Queen's.

Since moving to Annahilt, Co Down, the Church of the Ascension became Aileen's spiritual home where she was a regular attendee at worship and for two successive years served as People's Churchwarden. She was a truly dedicated holder of that Office, where her cheerfulness and welcoming disposition were infectious and appreciated by many, especially elderly parishioners and visitors to the Church. One of the unofficial but vital duties of the Churchwardens in Annahilt which is situated at a very bad bend on a busy main road, is to see the Sunday School teachers and pupils safely across to the Parochial Hall mid-way through the Church Service. In that role, Aileen endeared herself to the entire Sunday School by chatting with the children and taking an interest in them.

Aileen worked very closely and effectively with her fellow Churchwarden, Graham

Galbraith. They complemented each other magnificently in their respective roles.

Aileen was an avid sports fan and a life-long supporter of Leeds United. For a number of years Aileen was also a diligent and industrious member of the Committee which ran successive Craft Fairs each year in Annahilt Parish. Aileen was always good fun, good humoured, and had a “**can-do**” attitude.

A death such as Aileen’s shocks and saddens us all. We have each suffered a great loss, but especially Aileen’s brother George, her sister-in-law Noleen, her cousin Pat and all her relatives to whom we extend our deep and prayerful sympathy.

In due course it is intended to hold a Service of Thanksgiving for Aileen’s life in the Church of the Ascension, Annahilt.

Richard Walker, Rocklands, Annahilt

Following services at home and in the Church of the Ascension, Annahilt cremation took place privately

Richard was born in Belfast, the eldest son of Pamela and the late William Walker. He was followed by his siblings Brian, David and Alison. He attended Stranmillis Primary and Annadale Grammar schools and had happy memories of his time at both. Richard was a keen sportsman who remained a life-long fan of football, cricket, rugby, gold and Formula 1. He was a true blue, Everton, his dearly beloved, and Linfield, top of his league. He spent many Saturday afternoons and Boxing Days at Windsor Park with his brother David, daughter Lauren and nephew Simon. Being Richard he had a regular spot he liked to park in.

Richard was popular, keeping many friends from school, the Boys’ Brigade, where he was an officer, and the Air Training Corps. Family summers were spent on the Isle of Wight, with his much loved grandparents. The siblings still talk about those years when they cycled, crabbed, shrimped, and Richard’s favourite, bell ringing, with which he even convinced his Mum to join in!

Richard was a life-long music fan with Queen always top of his list and Kate Bush coming a close second. In later years, the Corrs and Pink also joined the list.

At the age of 18 Richard joined the RUC and loved his time in the Constabulary.

On Boxing Day 1981 Richard met Marie. They married in June 1983 and in 1987

moved to the family home in Annahilt. Kristen, Ashleigh, Lauren came along and Richard was always a very proud Dad.

Murlough Bay was the favourite walk for the family, enjoyed most on cold crisp days. Picnics were and continued to do be a favourite, even in the winter. The memorable holidays in France started with an AA route map, packing the roof box and packing the car was always an art, made even harder on the return as Marie had shopped a lot.

Food played a huge part of family life, Richard even packed his own curry spices to use on holiday!

Richard was a content, happy person, who loved pottering in the garden, reading the paper and watching Coronation Street on TV. Beyond these simple pursuits Richard was always ready to help others, in the family, his friends and neighbours and latterly joining an NHS Review Board and becoming a MacMillan Volunteer Coordinator.

We extend our deep and sincere sympathy to Marie, Kristen, Asleigh and Lauren and the entire family circle in their great loss.

Parish of Annahilt – Annual Easter General Vestry Meeting – Monday 19 April 2021

In his opening remarks the Rector reported that in 2020 the Parish's official membership (those households who are subscribers) stood at 132 family units. However, there are additional households who have called on the Rector's ministrations, although they have no formal link with the Parish or who wish to identify with the Parish without making any official commitment. There were two baptisms and two funerals.

The Rector welcomed any who have joined our worshipping community in recent times and sympathised with all who have been bereaved. In particular, he referred to the passing of Mrs Esther Ferguson, wife of the late Revd Jack Ferguson, former Rector of the Parish. As well as being enormously supportive of her husband in his ministry, Mrs Ferguson played a huge role in her own right in the life of this and other parishes as well as in the wider diocese, especially in the Mothers' Union. The Rector also referred to the passing of his mother, bringing to an end a very happy association with the Group of Parishes during the years she lived at the Rectory. He renewed his thanks for the extensive support shown by parishioners to him and his siblings at their time of great loss. He also mentioned the very untimely death of Professor Aileen Stockdale. As the People's Churchwarden over a two year period Aileen impressed us by her dedication to the Office, where her cheerfulness and welcoming disposition were infectious and appreciated by many. On the Select Vestry and on the Craft Fair Committee she was inspirational as a real team player as well as a hard-working and conscientious colleague. Reference was also made to the very recent death of HRH the Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh just two months short of his 100th birthday. He said the Duke's legacy was enormous, particularly as The Queen's Consort and as founder of the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme.

Worship and prayer were paramount during 2020 which contributed to the spiritual well-being of participants and the reinforcement of Christian values. There was a Service on Ash Wednesday to mark the beginning of Lent at which the Bishop, the Rt Revd David McClay presided and preached on his first visit to the Group of Parishes. On account of the coronavirus pandemic In-Church Services and other parochial activities were suspended from 22 March to 12 September and again from 23 November to 12 December. Holy Week (the week before Easter) was observed with mid-week Services transmitted on-line. The Devotional Speaker was the Rt Revd John McDowell, Bishop of Clogher and Archbishop elect of Armagh. The annual Christmas Carol Service proceeded, unfortunately without the participation of our Church Choir or the participation by the Choir of Annahilt Primary School on account of social distancing. However, a long-standing reciprocal arrangement was continued whereby the Minister and Congregation of Legacurry Presbyterian Church attended the First

Communion of Christmas in the Parish Church on Christmas Eve, and the Rector and Parishioners of Annahilt Church of Ireland attended the Watchnight Service in Legacurry on New Year's Eve. Both events were proportionately attended by members of both the Church of Ireland and Presbyterian Churches.

The Parochial Hall is a very useful facility which regrettably has been out of use during the global pandemic. It will no doubt prove its worth again in advancing Christian activity in our parish in future years.

Prior to lock-down a splendid Dinner to celebrate Burns' Night took place in January in the nearby Larchfield Estate and Grounds. Items for the local food-bank were donated at collection points in various retail outlets and proved to be of immense benefit for those in our community who are less fortunate than others.

Concerning the Church grounds, the allocation of responsibility to an outside contractor has continued to be very beneficial. Additional work was also done on a voluntary basis by parishioners. The overall effect has been noted with pleasure and appreciation by both parish members and visitors alike. The Select Vestry remain committed to the upkeep and development of all parochial property and assets for the future benefit of the Parish and the public.

Various steps were taken throughout the year to ensure that the Parish is compliant with new GDPR regulations.

Drawing his remarks to a close, the Rector thanked everyone who had contributed to Parish life during the year.

During the meeting, the Trustees' Report was presented by the Honorary Treasurer, Miss J P Halliday and the annual elections were held.

Parish of Magherahamlet – Annual Easter General Vestry Meeting – Wednesday 21 April 2021

In his opening remarks the Rector referred to the unprecedented lockdown on account of the global pandemic.

In 2020 the Parish's official membership (those households who are subscribers) stood at 63 family units. However, there are additional households who have called on the Rector's ministrations although they have no formal link with the Parish or who wish to identify with the Parish without making any official commitment. He welcomed any who have joined our worshipping community in recent times and sympathised with all who have been bereaved. With deep regret he recorded the passing of Ian Douglas. The Rector also mentioned the passing of his mother and how much she enjoyed worshipping in church as well as the friendship and consideration offered by parishioners over the years. He renewed thanks for the support given to him and his siblings at a very difficult time.

Worship and prayer were paramount during 2020 notwithstanding the extended period of lockdown. Holy Week was observed with mid-week Services held on-line with the Rt Revd John McDowell, Bishop of Clogher and Archbishop elect of Armagh as Devotional Speaker. On Remembrance Sunday, the Bishop, the Rt Revd David McClay made his first visit to Magherahamlet and preached. Last year it was not possible to hold the annual united Christmas Carol Service which usually alternates each year with our parish and the two local Presbyterian Churches. Instead each Church held its own Service.

The new Parochial Hall is a splendid facility which in the eight and a half years since its official opening has more than proved its worth in advancing Christian activity in our parish. Unfortunately during the public health emergency it is not possible to hold activities there. We greatly look forward to when it will be feasible to resume holding events there.

The Select Vestry affirmed that the Church of Ireland child protection policy 'Safeguarding Trust' is being implemented by the Parish. During the year various steps were taken to ensure that the Parish is compliant with new GDPR regulations.

Concerning the Church and Hall grounds, they always look immaculate. The overall effect has been noted with pleasure by both parishioners and visitors alike, a great credit to the Glebewardens and other dedicated volunteers. The Select Vestry remain committed to the upkeep and development of all parochial property and assets for the future benefit of the parish and the public.

Drawing his remarks to a close, the Rector thanked everyone who had contributed to Parish life during the year.

During the meeting, the Parish Trustees Report was presented and the annual elections were held.

Dear Mothers' Union Members and Friends,

It feels good to be greeting you this month with an air of optimism as we experience the gradual easing of some aspects of lockdown and also as we appreciate the brighter and warmer weather.

We are delighted too that our Trustees and Branch representatives were able to participate in the Down and Dromore Diocesan Council Meeting using "Zoom" on Tuesday 27th April 2021. While listening to the Trustees delivering their reports which sincerely acknowledged the devastating effect that the pandemic was having on everyone, especially the poorest and most underprivileged people in the world, it was also truly uplifting to hear about the amazing work, dedication and generosity of Mothers' Union members that was focussed on addressing as many aspects of this situation as possible. Huge thanks and appreciation was expressed from everyone and to everyone for the support that has been given and for the benefits that have been achieved so far.

We hope too that you enjoyed reading your new magazine 'Connected' that you will have received direct from Mary Sumner House. This publication acknowledges that, in

the face of this pandemic, Mothers' Union members are even more united as a fellowship of Christians throughout the world, putting faith into action and working with communities and others towards building a future free of poverty, violence and injustice. Emphasis is being put on empowering local people to work together to learn new skills and attitudes and to pass them on so that they can, in time, become self-reliant in growing food, learn to care for each other and will possess the know-how and ability to set up their own successful projects.

The next communication that you will receive will include 'The Irish Spin' - an 'All Ireland' document which examines the campaigning for social justice involving governments, groups and individuals. At present the most important news sheets for all members in Down and Dromore Diocese to read and act upon is our All Ireland President, June Butler's "21 in 21" Sponsorship Challenge aimed at raising funds for "Mums in May" projects.
